A Word from Dr. Satterly

Over 50 years ago, Westminster Academy was an idea born around a dining room table, drawn on a paper napkin by Dr. D. James Kennedy, and supported by several families at Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church. God has indeed been faithful in transforming this vision into an established and nationally recognized academic institution. As we celebrated our Golden Anniversary throughout the 2021–22 school year, our theme for the year was *Rooted*. Based on Jeremiah 17:8, *Rooted* captures the commitment of Westminster Academy to be "like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream…" The key to this verse lies with the tree's roots and the stream. Jesus is the stream; He is the living water. It is when our roots are anchored in the living water that we keep green leaves and bear fruit. Westminster Academy was planted by the water and its roots run down deep to the stream. 

We didn't see the sacrifice and late nights spent planning and orchestrating the inception of Westminster Academyfrom assembling the administrative staff and teachers, securing a location, constructing the facilities, and overseeing the curriculum. fathomed the foundation that was laid would enable us to receive an excellent education with spiritual depth and moral integrity, preparing us for Godly participation in American society and loyalty to God and our country?

Mission & Legacy Leadership

Westminster Academy has had only five headmasters in our five decades and we honor them for their sacrificial service that has shaped our school.

Harry Miller 1971–1973

Reverend Harry Miller was serving as the Minister of Evangelism at Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church when he was appointed by Dr. Kennedy to become the first headmaster. He was a pioneer in Christian education and instrumental in laying the foundation for our school in our first few years. In one of WA's earliest publications, Harry wrote, "In a disciplined,

orderly environment, concerned teachers endeavor to prepare our children for a satisfying and God-honoring life now and for the glorious life of the eternity! When pupils know the Lord Jesus Christ personally, they know the One who brings them into harmony with God, with themselves, and with their fellow men, and with creation itself."

Ken Wackes 1973–2005

Dr. Ken Wackes took a job teaching Bible at Westminster Academy while he was waiting for a pastorate position, after receiving his Doctor of Ministry degree. He only intended to be at WA one year, but after a couple of months, Ken was asked to fill the position of headmaster and he replied, "No thanks, but I will take over until you find someone else." However, after serving in the position for several months Ken realized that all his gifts were being fully used, so he accepted the headmaster position in 1973 and faithfully served for thirty-two years as Headmaster at Westminster Academy and Associate Minister at Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church. He also served as Executive Director of Christian Schools of Florida and in several other leadership roles. He once wrote, "The full impact of Christian schools, like Westminster, will not be felt in our society until our sons and daughters take their positions as leaders in the various areas of society. They will have been nurtured in a philosophical and emotional framework that stands in direct opposition to the prevailing humanism of the secular school." A legion of successful WA alumni provides testimony to that vision. Many of our alumni were in his "Marriage and Family"



class their senior year, went to him for premarital counseling, asked him to officiate their wedding, and baptize their children. Dr. Wackes truly made an eternal investment in countless lives and was bestowed the honor of Headmaster Emeritus in 2019.

Greg Beaupied 2005-2008

"What amazes me is how the Lord provided a wonderful school with superior Christian values

when our children needed to be in such a loving and Spirit-led community. Godly men and women dreamed big dreams. The vision was cast, land was purchased, buildings were constructed, staff was hired, and hundreds of students enrolled right from the beginning. We must think of Westminster Academy in two important ways before we recount its many excellencies. First, God was up to something extraordinary for Fort Lauderdale and the Christian

community. How could so many factors come together so quickly with such a sanctified result? It is a difficult thing to start and establish a new Christian academy. But, Westminster seemingly burst into reality with such vigor and promise. One moment it was not there, the next moment it was a dream, and then almost overnight, there it was. Truly remarkable! Second, God used dedicated people to sacrifice, dig deep into their faith, and persevere throughout the process. People cared so much and gave so much to make our beloved school all it continues to be. Over the years, others have stepped up to nurture this school along. Many have made enormous contributions, allowing WA to grow and flourish, and hundreds more have dedicated their time and treasure to keep the dream moving forward. My vision when I served as headmaster was to carry on the Westminster Academy legacy, training young men and women academically and spiritually so that they could succeed in college, in their chosen careers and in life. As I look to the future, I believe we will continue to see Westminster Academy students and graduates making a difference in their communities, in their own homes, and in the furthering of the Kingdom of God."

"It is my privilege and pleasure to serve as Westminster Academy's fifth headmaster. God appointed each of us for a particular season. Each tenure has included leadership opportunities and challenges. While many of those historical events are captured in the pages of this special edition of the *PawPrint*,

mine includes navigating a global pandemic and the blessing of leading through our golden anniversary and developing a strategic plan for re-envisioning our campus.

There is much to consider when reviewing the first 50 years of our school but three big trends stand out to me.

The first is God's faithfulness. While it is true that WA has been blessed with outstanding faculty and staff who have impacted over 4,000 alumni; an institution doesn't see 50 years on its own merit. Westminster Academy's legacy and story is a tapestry of God's faithfulness. In good times and lean ones, God has been, and is, at work.

Another theme that characterizes Westminster Academy is vision. What started as an idea sketched out on a paper napkin at a kitchen table is now the school we enjoy today. In 1971, we held classes over at the Pompano Beach racetrack. Now our program requires two campuses. From those humble beginnings, our founders saw a great institution and that vision has been in our DNA ever since.

The third feature that stands out is a commitment to mission fidelity. School matters because it is the place where students spend over 16,000 hours of programmed training. Westminster Academy was, is, and will always be devoted to Christ and dedicated to excellence. We have a long track record demonstrating that commitment and also have a unique opportunity to prepare for the future."

As part of this special chapel, students filled a new time capsule which will be opened in 2031 with new memorabilia.

This was the vision of Dr. D. James Kennedy and the founding families of Westminster Academy. Five decades later we now have



First Decade "Excellence in All Things and All Things for God's Glory." Dr. D. James Kennedy, Westminster Academy Founder On September 4, 1971, 340 students and 21 teachers gathered in four locations—including the Pompano Race Track—for the first day of classes at Westminster Academy. The lifelong relationships formed in those first days marked the beginning of the Westminster Academy experience. Our committed parents partnered to form the Parent Teacher





Fellowship and Booster Club, and by the end of the 70s, WA was home to ten fiercely competitive athletic teams with two state titles and an outstanding Fine Arts program featuring visual arts, band, orchestra, and drama.

In 1978, Headmaster Dr. Ken Wackes, whose "Marriage and Family" course helped countless alumni families begin with a solid godly foundation, announced Westminster Academy's accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and Florida Council of Independent Schools. That same year the new Arts and Science wing was added, and in 1979, the James F. Lindsay Gymnasium was completed. Alumni grew from the first eight graduates in 1973 to 63 in 1979 and the Alumni Association began.

Each piece of our unique culture was created with a commitment to excellence in academics, athletics, and the arts. From weekly chapels to school plays to homecoming games, many of our long-standing and cherished traditions and programs began in the 1970s.



Second Decade


The 1980s brought many additional firsts...

...National Honor Society, Advanced Placement courses, the Science Fair, Headmaster's Council, Grandparents Day, senior jerseys, and an overseas band trip to Ecuador. Athletics received the first of numerous Most Outstanding Athletic Program Awards from the Florida Athletic Coaches Association. The All-Sports Award was presented by the conference for the best win-loss record of the year and two more state championships were claimed by Ladies' Track and Field and five by Men's Cross Country.

OPTIME yearbook did a remarkable job capturing the essence of WA and was selected as a Columbia Scholastic Press Association Medalist, the first of many accolades to come. WAFG radio (Westminster Academy for God) launched and gave students the opportunity to explore their gifts and talents in communications. Westminster Academy received additional accreditation from Christian Schools of Florida.







Third Decade The 1990s were a time of expansion and technological advancements.

In 1994, the Media and Fine Arts building was dedicated, housing two libraries, computer labs, orchestra, band, and administrative offices. This expansion was made possible through the generosity of the Hamilton M. and Blanche C. Forman Christian Foundation, and the campus was named the Blanche Collins Forman Campus.





College credit courses and a community service program were launched for high school students, and the Fine Arts Department produced the first Madrigal Dinner. Football and baseball won their first state championships, Ladies' Basketball earned two state titles, while Softball added four state titles to their stellar record. The Alumni Tailgate tradition began and school spirit soared. In 1997, Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church and WA announced the purchase of 34 acres of land near West Commercial Boulevard and ground was broken for a swimming complex at the east campus. The O'Brien Family Swimming Complex was completed in 1999. By the end of the decade, Westminster Academy had 1,700 alumni.






Fourth Decade

A major milestone marked the 2000s...

...as the development of the west campus Athletic Complex accelerated the growth and strength of the athletics program. The DeVos Family Baseball Field was ranked the #1 high school baseball facility in the nation by *USA Today* and hosted the first nationally televised tournament in the country. The H.W. Huizenga Family Football Field, Hill Family Track & Field Complex, and Zachariah Family Tennis Complex were state-of-the-art facilities. Baseball won another state championship, along with Men's Basketball and Men's Track.

Highlights of the decade include the beginning of the Robotics program, the choir's first performance at Carnegie Hall and an overseas trip to Italy, and the first 8th grade trip to Washington, D.C. The retirement of Headmaster, Dr. Ken Wackes, marked the end of an era. He often said, "Begin with the End in Mind" and he was instrumental in laying the foundation for the Westminster Academy experience.







Fifth Decade In our fifth decade, Westminster Academy's ongoing commitment to *excellence in all things* was rewarded across all of our programs. The Lower School received recognition as a National Blue Ribbon School in 2014, and in 2020, WA became a full member of council with the Council on Educational Standards and Accountability (CESA), a mark of distinction among Christian schools. Our Fine Arts Program earned WA the Enrollment Award by the Florida Music Educators Association for surpassing 35% of





our student population participating in the Fine Arts, and our students continued to be invited to perform in noted festivals and locations overseas. By 2022, our athletic teams earned an astounding 267 district, 92 regional, and 28 state championships, including a Three-peat Basketball State Championship, the second in Broward County history. The Robotics team won several awards earning state, national, and even world recognition, continuing WA's commitment to leading the way in technological advancements. To that end, our campus updates included the IQ Lab, a STEAMfocused, 21st-century innovation lab, and the renovation of the Dr. Kenneth P. Wackes Media Center, named for our Headmaster Emeritus. Technology became a critical component of remote learning at the end of this decade, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. While methods changed, our mission remained the same.

Westminster Academy now boasts over 4,000 alumni impacting our communities, our nation, and our world in every sphere of society. We are proud of our alumni—their character, accomplishments, and impact for the Kingdom of God.

Only the Lord could have known what He had in store with the 'vision' that these two men had back then! I believe that everyone who has attended WA since then has had a special calling and a purpose for their lives."

Wini now lives in California and was unable to attend our Golden Anniversary Weekend, but she made a special \$50,000 donation in honor of our 50th Anniversary in hopes that others might be inspired to support the mission of WA.



The Stories Behind the Names

East Campus

Blanche Collins Forman Campus

The Media and Fine Arts Center was dedicated on October 22, 1994. The Hamilton M. and Blanche C. Forman Christian Foundation was the primary benefactor for the project, along with parents and members of Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church. Our east campus is named in honor of Mrs. Blanche Collins Forman, in recognition of her generosity and strong support of education. Blanche was a godly mother, pioneer, educator, principal, and businesswoman. She held deep-seated convictions firmly rooted in the teachings of the Bible and spent her lifetime enabling others to succeed. Blanche and Hamilton M. Forman were also instrumental in founding First Christian Church Fort Lauderdale. Three of their great-grandchildren are current students.



Hamilton McClure Forman and Blanche Collins Forman were pioneers from Illinois who arrived here in 1910 aboard Henry Flagler's railroad. They pitched a tent in the Everglades on land they bought sight unseen. When growing potatoes proved difficult, they started South Florida's first dairy farm in 1914 in what is now Davie and were the first tenders of the Sewell Lock on the New River Canal at Davie Road. Their sons, Hamilton C. Forman and Charles R. Forman, together with their wives, influenced the development of and operation of the North Broward Hospital District for 28 years, as well as the water management district and the route of Florida's Turnpike.

The Forman family legacy spans over 100 years in Florida and their work continues through the Hamilton M. and Blanche C. Forman Christian Foundation, managed by M. Austin Forman, H. Collins Forman, Jr., and Walter Forman, the grandsons of Hamilton M. and Blanche Collins Forman.



James F. Lindsay Gymnasium

The dedication of the James F. Lindsay Gymnasium took place on November 10, 1979. Three years prior, construction had come to a halt due to a lack of sufficient funding. Though parents made contributions and students held fundraisers, it was a final gift from James F. Lindsay that made the dream a reality. Lindsay gave \$200,000, one-third of the auctioned price of his coin collection, to the campaign. He shared at the dedication that he had no children of his own but that he would consider all who used the new facility as his grandchildren. Dr. Ron Kovack, an alumni parent and dedicated supporter of WA, wrote a book on the topic of charitable giving and stewardship, *A Gift That Changed the World*, which includes the story of the coin collection sold that completed the gymnasium capital campaign.

Kenneth P. Wackes Media Center

Our newly renovated Dr. Kenneth P. Wackes Media Center was re-dedicated at a ceremony in the spring of 2019. We celebrated the completion of the project, but above all, we honored the life of our Headmaster Emeritus, Dr. Ken Wackes. Virtually everyonein the room was directly impacted by the life and work of Dr. Wackes—both as a leader and shepherd. We also heard from Ken's lovely wife, Ruth, who joined us with her children and grandchildren. Technology and advancement were always at the forefront of Dr. Wackes' vision for WA. Ruth felt it was quite fitting that this space bears his name, honoring his commitment to growth and learning.

The new design efficiently utilizes the current space while taking into consideration changes in instructional methods, technology, and the need for both individual and group study areas.

Two trees stand tall in the Lower School Media Center honoring the lives of Laurie Meacham '04 King, and Lilianne Lier Pacienza. A plaque on Laurie's tree includes Jeremiah 17:8 and the words '*What's my legacy*?' also appear in her handwriting. While Laurie was hospitalized, the family read from her WA senior Bible where she had written the words "What is my legacy?" Since going to be with the Lord, Laurie's legacy has been revealed in the lives of so many whom she touched in her 31 years this side of Heaven.

Lily's plaque includes Psalm 46:10—it was her Psalm—*her* song of trust. Before Lily went to live with the Lord she would recite this verse, "Be still and know that I am God." One of her favorite books was *Be Still*, a meditation on Psalm 46:10. Lily would add her own personal touch to a quote from the book, "God is mighty and strong, gentle and kind, like a kitty, (Lily's addition) He is all-powerful, all-knowing, all-loving God." Only God could arrange for a three-year-old to recite this comforting passage that would minister to her family while she lives in heaven.

Festus & Helen Stacy Foundation Lending Library

The Festus & Helen Stacy Foundation, the Stepelton family's private foundation, was founded in 1980. Located in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, they partner with Christian organizations worldwide that have demonstrated the ability to make a lasting impact benefiting mankind by helping others and extending the love, mercy, and teachings of Jesus Christ. Westminster Academy has been blessed by the generosity of the Festus & Helen Stacy Foundation in multiple endeavors, including the renovation of our west campus Athletic Complex turf field and the Dr. Kenneth P. Wackes Media Center renovation. In recognition of their generosity, the lending library of the Upper School Media Center bears their name. The Stepeltons are also a proud alumni family.

Lou Church Educational Foundation Board Room

The Lou Church Educational Foundation is named after Lou Church, an entrepreneur who was a shining example of the ability to prosper if you're willing to work hard, take risks, innovate, and make use of your talents for the benefit of others. From humble beginnings, he developed a successful swimming pool construction company. Next, he created both a thriving restaurant business and travel agency. Through the Lou Church Educational Foundation, he hoped to preserve and perpetuate the values of a free enterprise system, of which education is a central component.

When Lou Church passed away in 1995, he bequeathed the foundation to his dear friend, Dr. Robert Helmholdt, to carry out his mission and values. Today, Mrs. Margie Helmholdt serves as Chair of the Foundation and continues to fulfill the mission, with a focus on organizations impacting our culture for Christ. The late Dr. Helmholdt, WA alumni parent and former President of the Lou Church Educational Foundation, said, "Lou Church was a dear friend of mine who loved children and had a profound appreciation for education. I'm sure that he'd be pleased to know that his foundation is helping to further education at a great school like Westminster Academy." The foundation has graciously gifted over \$400,000 since 2002, for financial assistance and several east campus capital projects. Both a multi-purpose room and the executive board room located in the Dr. Kenneth P. Wackes Media Center, bear the name of the Lou Church Education.











O'Brien Family Swimming Complex

The O'Brien Family Swimming Complex opened in June of 1999, just in time for summer camp and swim lessons. Bob and Marguerite O'Brien were instrumental in funding the Olympic-size pool. Their daughter, Cassandra Lee, tragically passed away in a car accident. Through trials, their faith triumphed. They understood Christ to be the Living Water, refreshing their souls which in part led to their desire to donate towards the pool as well as the fountain at the entrance of Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church. In addition to these capital projects, they provided a scholarship in their daughter's memory. For 23 years, thousands of students, community residents, and visitors have benefited from the swimming facilities at Westminster Academy—swimming, diving, and water polo competitions; safety training and swim lessons; summer camp, and just plain having fun in the water!

The Coningsby Family Training Pool

The Coningsby Family Training Pool is named in honor of the entire Coningsby Family: Parents, Bob and Bette (who went to be with the Lord in 2020), and their children and spouses: Bob and Diane, Todd and Joy, Gregg '81 and Susie, Russ and Cindy Perkins '79, and Kristi '88 and Bob Haley. Nine of Bob and Bette's grandchildren attended WA and one is a current student. The Coningsby family shares a legacy of generosity and has invested heavily in the robotics and tennis programs as well. We are grateful for their generosity from generation to generation.





West Campus

On Sunday, February 2, 1997, Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church and Westminster Academy announced the purchase of 34 acres of land near West Commercial Boulevard. Through the Project '97 Campaign, many generous donors helped develop the land into a state-of-the-art athletic complex.

Zachariah Family Tennis Complex

Dr. Mammen Zachariah and Dr. Molly Zachariah have been members of Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church for 32 years. In 1998, during a Sunday morning sermon, Dr. Kennedy preached about the importance of investing in the next generation. He then made an appeal for the congregation to support Westminster Academy's capital campaign for the west campus Athletic Complex. The Zachariahs responded to the invitation to support the endeavor and the Zachariah Family Tennis Complex was named in their honor. The tennis complex was dedicated on June 26, 2001, and Dr. Mammen Zachariah, Dr. Molly Zachariah, and their son, Roy, were present for the occasion.

Hill Family Track & Field Complex

The Hill Family Track & Field Complex was dedicated on March 20, 1999. Jim Hill attended Miami Jackson High School where he ran track and in his senior year, set the school record in the quarter-mile relay




team. Jim recognized track as a sport requiring individual talents as well as teamwork, and one where both girls and boys can participate. "That and the discipline involved in the sport makes it very appealing for my wife, Ginger, and me to support. Ginger and I feel strongly about Westminster Academy and the great environment it provides for young people. The education they receive, the moral upbringing with the teaching based in the scriptures, and the love of Jesus so evident for the little ones through the high school is why we want to support this ministry," Jim shared. They were also proud WA grandparents. Thanks to generous gifts from Jim and Ginger Hill, along with gifts from alumni, alumni parents, friends, and two grants from the Broward County Waste Tire Agency, the track was completed and was ready for its first season on the west campus.



H.W. Huizenga Family Football Field

The late Wayne Huizenga was a businessman and entrepreneur. He founded AutoNation and Waste Management Inc. and was the owner or co-owner

of Blockbuster Video, the Miami Dolphins, the Florida Panthers, and the Florida Marlins (now Miami Marlins). Wayne Huizenga and his family had a long history of assisting Christian schools and Westminster Academy was blessed to be the recipient of a generous gift from the Huizenga Family Foundation in 1998 and 1999 that largely funded the field at the west campus Athletic Complex. Wayne and his wife Marti also donated to our 1978 capital campaign toward the gymnasium. Their daughter, Pamela Huizenga, attended WA in the 6th and 7th-grade.



DeVos Family Baseball Field

Richard and Helen DeVos had a long history of generosity towards Westminster Academy and Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church. In 1996, they provided the start-up donation of \$1.2 million for the procurement of

the land for the west campus. The DeVos Family Baseball Field is named for them in honor of their generosity. Richard was the co-founder of Amway and owner of the Orlando Magic basketball team. He also authored several books including, *Hope From My Heart: Ten Lessons For Life*. The latter reflects his feelings after successfully undergoing a heart transplant operation in the United Kingdom in 1997 after being turned down for a transplant in the United States because of his age and diabetes. The Class of 2001 was blessed to have Mr. DeVos as their commencement speaker and he shared from his book, *"Do not let fear control you, do not let what others may think you can or cannot do determine what you can do if you want to do it. And so fear, we can overcome by faith."* We were honored to have their daughter, Betsy DeVos, Former Secretary of Education, provide a special message for the Class of 2020.

The DeVos Family Baseball Complex was recognized by USA Today in 2000 as the top high school baseball facility in the nation and hosted the first nationally televised high school baseball tournament in the country.

Laurie Meacham '04 King Scholarship

Laurie Meacham '04 King had a zest for life and service to others that were unparalleled and contagious. Her devotion to family and her faith in the saving grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, was the foundation that allowed her to shine in the lives of so many. Though her impact was wide-reaching, Laurie loved to minister to others one on one, meeting them at the very point of their need. Despite her daily health challenges, she used every opportunity to support others in times of need with prayer, encouragement, and action. Laurie's family created this scholarship to provide financial assistance for students who experience hardship and to honor Laurie's legacy of encouraging others in their time of need.

Michael Grimmé Scholarship

This scholarship was created by Donald and Pamela Grimmé, Michael's grandparents. Michael was a junior at WA when he tragically passed away in 2006. Their desire is to honor Michael and recognize a student, nominated by a faculty member, who demonstrated the most improvement at the end of his/her sophomore year. Michael's parents also donated the Grimmé clock which has become a landmark on our campus, reminding students to deeply appreciate the time they have together and encouraging students to live every moment to the fullest.

Foundation for Christian Living

This scholarship is awarded annually to a rising freshman who has been identified for demonstrating Christian character by members of the Westminster Academy community. The purpose of this scholarship is to encourage Christian parents to provide a Christ-centered education for their children and to encourage Christian students in being the light of the world by letting their light so shine that others may see their good deeds and glorify our Father in heaven. The scholarship is renewed annually as long as the student remains enrolled and continues to set an example of Christian character. The Foundation for Christian Living was established by an alumni family who wishes to remain anonymous.

The story of the Westminster Academy High School Robotics Team begins in the year 2000 when Fred and Karen Hord of HPE Automation Corporation, Motorola Inc., and FRC Team 267 – Demolition Squad planted the idea for a new robotics team with the owners of APEX Machine Company, a physics teacher, and a small group of students at Pine Crest School. Within the same year, APEX Machine Company invited Dr. Wackes to explore high school robotics and he tasked a new science teacher and engineer, Kent Stolley, to lead this endeavor. Within a few short weeks, WA students were working on building their first robot as part of an alliance with Pine Crest School, Westminster Academy, and a

local industrial plant! The team became known as FRC Team 710 PAW and we worked so well together that we earned a Johnson & Johnson Sportsmanship Award. Judges loved the tale of two fierce rival schools building and competing so well together. In 2008, we became a oneschool team, FRC Team 744—Shark Attack, and since that time, we have won 26 major awards, and also gained a reputation as "the team that prays!" Recent years required flexibility due to the pandemic canceling in-person competitions, but our team competed on the world stage using videos of our robot performing several assigned tasks in the WA

gymnasium. When the results were analyzed and confirmed by the judges, our team had outscored all others in Florida. This year our team earned its way to the quarter-finals as an alliance captain in each of two regional competitions!

We focus on aiding the design of new and existing rides, shows, and attractions through computer simulation to help ensure they will work before they are built. In particular, I get to work in the areas of animatronics and robotics in which my learning and interest began on the robotics team at WA. I knew out of high school what I wanted to do, which is rare." When asked how WA helped him discover his gifts and talents, Dan shared, "the robotics side of this is obvious through the club, team, and support. I think the other side is leadership. The foundation and worldview I developed at WA helped me transition into leadership roles in college and eventually the workplace."

Athletics Excellence at the Next Level

Danny Kanell '92 2014 WA Hall of Honor Inductee

Danny was a gifted all-around athlete who played football, basketball, and baseball. He led WA to one of its first state championships in 1990. Following his high school football career,

he played quarterback for the Florida State Seminoles for all four years, where he broke almost all passing records, totaling 6,372

yards and 57 touchdowns.

He won the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) in the category of Player of the Year in 1995. In the same year, he also won the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) in the category of Offensive Player of the Year. He was drafted by the New York Giants in the fourth round and also played professionally for the Atlanta Falcons and Denver Broncos from 1996 to 2004. He was inducted into the Broward Sports Hall of Fame as the Class of 2008. Danny was the first WA athlete to be honored with the Brian Piccolo Award in 1992. He was the first-ever to have a jersey retired in 2009. Currently, Danny is a CBS sports football analyst.



Matthew den Dekker '06

2016 WA Hall of Honor Inductee

Matt played baseball and golf at Westminster Academy. He led the team his senior year with a batting average of .460 and also had three home runs, 29 hits, 26 runs scored, 13 RBIs, and a pitching record of 4–1. Matt then received an athletic scholarship to play baseball for the University of Florida. The Gators made it to the 2010 College World Series and he made the national spotlight

as he was highlighted on ESPN SportsCenter Top Ten Plays. He was offered the opportunity to play professionally his junior year but felt he still had room to improve and continued with the Gators his senior season. After graduation, he signed with the New York Mets organization and played for their AA team in Birmingham as well as their AAA team in Buffalo. He then played professionally for the Washington Nationals as an Outfielder. Matt retired in 2019 after ten seasons in Major League Baseball with the Mets, Nationals, and Tigers. He is currently coaching with the New York Mets in player development.





Kevin Chapman '06

2014 WA Hall of Honor Inductee

Kevin played baseball for Westminster Academy and was a dominate left-handed pitcher. After being named *Sun Sentinel's* Player of the Year his junior year, Kevin played baseball for the University of Florida and then signed with the Kansas City Royals in 2010. He was traded to the Houston Astros in 2012. He was called up to the majors for the first time in August of 2013, and played for the Houston Astros until 2016.

Michael Taylor '09

2015 WA Hall of Honor Inductee

Michael played baseball and basketball for Westminster Academy. He was a three-year letter winner in baseball and was named Offensive Player of the Year. He was also Second Team All-State and First Team All-County in baseball. After graduating from WA, Michael was drafted in the sixth round of the 2009 MLB draft by the Washington Nationals and made his MLB debut with them in 2014. Michael's many honors include Potomac National Player of the Year, 2014 Baseball American AAA All-Star, 2014 Rookie of the Year Eastern League, and 2014 Future Stars Game Selection. In 2019, the season culminated with a Washington Nationals World Series victory over the Houston Astros. In addition, Michael became only the 39th player in Major League history to hit a home run in their first World Series at-bat. His WA jersey was retired in 2020 after this outstanding accomplishment. In 2020, he signed as a free agent with the Kansas City Royals and in 2021, Michael won the Gold Glove Award.



Anthony John Barbar '11 2016 WA Hall of Honor Inductee

AJ played basketball, water polo, and swam for Westminster Academy. He swam all three relays and the 50 yard freestyle. He received All-American and State Runner-Up in the 200 freestyle relay and was a state finalist in the 50 yard freestyle. He then



went on to swim for Oklahoma Baptist University's swim team. After graduation, AJ joined the Lebanon National Team and competed in the 50 meter butterfly race in the World Championship in Kazan, Russia. He received a best time and set a new Lebanese record for the 50 fly. His time

was 24.88 seconds which ranked him 44th at the World Championships. AJ then broke this record with a time of 24.25. He has also set a new record time of 23.29 in the 50 free style for Lebanon. AJ proudly represented Lebanon in the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro.

While Westminster Academy has had many nominees over the years, two have been selected to receive the prestigious honor of the Brian Piccolo Award, Danny Kanell '92 and Riley Clements '21. The National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Brian Piccolo Chapter

David Vila, Distinguished Professor of Religion and Philosophy,



She was president of the Broward County Bar Association Young Lawers Section (YLS) and also worked in the Executive Office of the Governor of Florida, prosecuted crimes as a Certified Legal Intern in the Leon County State Attorney's Office, and served as a



White House Legal Intern in the Office of the Counsel to the President of the United States. In 2019, Liza was one of 60 scholars chosen nationwide as a Presidential Leadership Scholar (PLS). The PLS program is a partnership among the Presidential Centers of George W. Bush, William J. Clinton, George H.W. Bush, and Lyndon B. Johnson, and designed for mid-career leaders from diverse backgrounds who share a commitment to helping solve society's greatest challenges.

Jennae Katic '20






